Class 1 Miss Redford

Thank you so much for all your efforts in helping to make the transition into school life as smooth as possible for your children. Class 1 will continue to build confidence and independence in school routines including the added expectation of reading records. At Aldborough, we believe it is extremely important that children read or are read to every day, so we would be very grateful if you could encourage this and record when this happens. Class 1 will continue to have Forest School on Monday afternoons and Science with Mrs Cuthill on Thursday afternoons. We ask that you keep PE kits in school all week as timetables can change.

English

In our English lessons, we will continue to read a range of story books including some Wintery favourites: Stick Man and The Gruffalo's Child. We will be focussing on the skill of retelling stories and will use some drama to develop an understanding of the different characters. We will



also discover some books which tell us more about the world around us, some of which will link with our topic (Celebrations). Class 1 will continue to develop their phonics with daily sessions in groups. This will help them to develop their reading, writing and spelling skills. It also allows them to develop their confidence in communication through language.

Class 1 will continue to develop their knowledge of number and the mathematical terms learnt so far (more than, less than), and begin to use this knowledge to add and subtract. The children will continue to 'think aloud' using their speaking and listening skills to explain their reasoning and to record this in a variety of ways.



Humanities

Our topic this term is Celebrations. The first week was a busy one, involving Halloween celebrations as well as Diwali. We used the Story of Rama & Sita to help us to understand why some people



celebrate the Festival of Light (Diwali). The children have started to create their own Divas (tealight holders) as well as firework paintings. Class 1 will continue to create some wonderful art with fireworks, when exploring Bonfire Night. Of course we still have another big celebration coming up in December which some of the children are beginning to get excited about!

We will continue to work on skills to improve spatial awareness, balance, coordination and control. This will include ball skills such as rolling, catching, throwing, bouncing and kicking. Each week, Class 1 also get the chance to practice Yoga and/or Dance.


Maths

Class 2 Mr Caston

This half term Class 2 will be studying the Great Fire of London to learn how the fire destroyed such a large area of London. We will compare a map from 1666 to a map of today to see how the landscape has changed. We will begin with a week of Poetry work to use our knowledge of different word types to write fantastic firework poems ready for 5th November.

In English we will be working on writing our own story maps after learning to perform a version we write together as a class. Diary entries, hot seating and interviewing will see us become journalists from 1666. Our findings will be presented in a newspaper article.

In Maths year 2 will work on addition and subtraction word problems, length and measure and interpreting and constructing graphs.



Year 1 will be getting to grips with learning the properties of 2D and 3D shapes before tackling addition and subtraction problems within 20.

In P.E we will continue building up our coordination and throwing and catching skills before moving on to work on kicking skills.

Firework Art using oil pastels will see us create our own displays. We will then make some fire collages to represent the burning buildings




during the Great Fire using black and the colours of fire. All of the above will be accompanied by us learning how to sing 'London's Burning' as a round. This work will then be followed by us working with Class 1 to arrange and rehearse our Nativity production titled 'Prickly Hay'. This is sure to be a lot of work but also a lot of fun for the children, get ready to learn lots of very catchy songs!

Class 3 Mr Care


Mr Care would like to say thank you to the parents for their kind wishes and cards after the birth of his son. Now it's time for the always-

exciting run up to
Christmas. After wrapping
up (intentional Christmas
pun) our Romans topic we
will be starting a new topic
on Winter. To accompany
our new topic, we will use
The Lion, the Witch and the
Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis as
our key text this half term.



In English this wonderful story will give us the chance to write setting descriptions, diary entries, character portraits, poetry and instructions. It should also allow for some exciting drama opportunities! We will be learning to use a range of subordinating conjunctions and fronted adverbials to add detail and description to our writing. As well as this we will be learning to use the first three letters of a word to check its spelling in a Dictionary. Please try this at home if possible.

In Maths we continue exploring strategies for addition and subtraction, including column method. We will begin with subtraction strategies and counting forward and backward on a number line to find the difference



between two numbers. We will then move on to shape, length and perimeter. Times tables will continue to be tested throughout the term. Remember, Year 4s are expected to know their 1x to 12x tables by the end of this year!

Class 4 Mrs Bearman


This half term Class 4 will be joined by Miss Chestney and Mrs Hall- Galley from UEA who will be sharing some of the teaching with Mrs Bearman. In our topic this half term Class 4 will be investigating the question, 'Who are our European Neighbours?' We will be using our geographical skills to identify and locate countries in Europe using an atlas. We will be learning about the






features of other European countries alongside their flags and currencies. We will be learning about the capital cities of Europe and the important landmarks within these. To fit in with our trip to the Royal Albert Hall we will be looking in detail at the city of London and comparing it with the city of Paris. Finally, the children will carry out an in-depth study of a European country of their choice. In RE we will be thinking about the Jewish festival of Hanukkah and we will link this to other winter festivals of light, in particular how Christmas is celebrated in other European countries. Our Art will be inspired by city landscapes. The children will have the opportunity to work in different mediums to produce city sky lines from around Europe.

In English, we will be continuing our work on biographies and autobiographies before beginning a unit on travel writing. We will be learning about the persuasive language used in travel books before writing our own travel log for a European destination. We hope to improve our use of possessive and personal pronouns, and expanding our sentences using subordinating conjunctions and embedded relative clauses. We will then be continuing our exploration of significant authors as we look at the writing of Phillip Pullman and write our own graphic novel, we hope to also turn our graphic novel into a film script. Our key texts will be 'The Real





Wonders of the World – The Lonely Planet Guide' and 'Clockwork' by Phillip Pullman.

In Maths we will be expanding our learning about place value before consolidating our understanding of addition and subtraction in relation to decimals, especially hundredths. We will be focusing on measurement, converting between different units of measurement before turning our attention to time and time intervals. Our number work will focus on division and addition and subtraction of fractions.

Multiplication tables are now used in all aspects of our curriculum and the children should be

practising these as often as possible at home and in school.

In PE we will be covering hockey skills in our outdoor sessions. In preparation for the Rugby World Cup Final, our indoor sessions will focus on dance and compiling our own version of the Hakka. Mrs Cuthill will continue to teach Science and this term the topics will be Electricity and Sound. Finally, in Music we will be working towards our performance in the Royal Albert Hall in November with additional rehearsals and workshops to make sure that we are performance ready.

Class 5 Mrs Morgan

Although for the Year 6 the pantomime makes this half term very busy, lines to learn and late night practice, the decision to put the Year 5 together for the performance means they will have lots to learn too.

In English the term focus is poetry with writing opportunities wrapped around the Ballad of Lord Lovelace as well as some other popular.

Maths will be fractions decimals and percentages, ratio and proportion followed by geometry.

In humanities we are studying the Scottish wars of independence and also for RE Buddhism.

Art will be all about perspective leading to creating the pantomime backdrop and of course the advent calendar.
